The Wise and Foolish Builders

Matthew 7: 24-29; Luke 6: 47-49

Memory verse: "Everyone then who hears these words of Mine and does them will be like a wise man..." Matthew 7: 24

(Jesus often told parables to His followers to help them understand what He was teaching them. Parables are stories that teach a spiritual lesson by comparing a spiritual thing to something earthly that the people understood. Parables teach us about things like the Kingdom of Heaven, lost people and repentance, love, forgiveness, and the Second Coming of Jesus on the Judgment Day.)

"Everyone then who hears these words of Mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house on the rock." The book of Luke says that he dug deep and laid the foundation on the rock. (A foundation is the base or bottom support on which a house is built.)

"And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded (built) on the rock." Luke says the house was well built.

"And everyone who hears these words of Mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand." Luke says he built a house without a foundation. "And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell, and great was the fall of it."

(This parable was part of Jesus' teachings which are called the Sermon on the Mount.) "And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at His teaching, for He was teaching them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes." (This means that the people were amazed because Jesus taught like a person who had the power to command people to do things.)

Lessons to Learn: We are wise when we hear the word of God and obey it. We are foolish when we hear the word of God and disobey it.

We should always obey all that God wants us to do.

Because Jesus is our God and Lord, He has the authority (power) to command us to do things.

Because Jesus is totally good, He will only command what is best for us.



Forgiving Debts

Luke 7: 41-48

Memory verse: "Her sins, which are many, are forgiven—for she loved much." Luke 7: 47

(Jesus told this parable after Mary, Lazarus' sister, had washed His feet and dried them with her hair.) And Simon thought to himself, "This man, if He were a prophet, would have known who and what kind of woman this is that touches Him: for she is a sinner."

And Jesus answering said unto him, "Simon, I have something to say unto you."

And he said, "Say it, Teacher."

"A certain moneylender had two debtors (people who owed him money). One owed five hundred denarii,(small Roman silver coin) and the other fifty denarii. When they could not pay, he cancelled the debt of both. Now which of them will love him more?"

Simon answered, "The one, I suppose, for whom he cancelled the larger debt."

And He said to him, "You have judged rightly."

Then turning toward the woman He said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave Me no water for My feet, but she has wet My feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not ceased to kiss My feet. (She did not stop kissing His feet.) You did not anoint My head with oil, but she has anointed My feet with ointment (something rubbed on the skin). Therefore I tell you, her sins, which are many, are forgiven—for she loved much. But he who is forgiven little, loves little."

And He said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." Then those who were at table with Him began to say among themselves, "Who is this, who even forgives sins?" And He said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

Lessons to Learn:

Jesus used a parable about people who owed money to teach a lesson about people who were sinners.

- Mary was a sinner, but Jesus forgave her sins because she loved Jesus very much.
- Jesus (God) can forgive people of many sins or of few sins, but the people who had many sins will love Him more because they had a larger debt to Him.

3 The Rich Fool

Luke 12: 16-21

Memory verse: So is the one who lays up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God." Luke 12: 21

And He (Jesus) said to them, "Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance (large amounts) of his possessions." (Covetousness is strongly wanting something you do not have and especially something that belongs to someone else. It is greediness and the desire to put riches first in one's life.)

And He told them a parable, saying, "The land of a rich man produced plentifully (produced many crops), and he thought to himself, 'What shall I do, for I have nowhere to store my crops?' And he said, 'I will do this: I will tear down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, "Soul, you have ample (plenty of) goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry."'

But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you, and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So is the one who lays up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God."

This parable does not teach that it is wrong to be rich. Many of God's people have been rich. Some examples are Abraham, Jacob, Solomon, and Job. But this parable shows us that we must use our wealth correctly. People who are rich must not think only about what they can do for themselves. And most of us are rich. We need to think about helping God's church spread the gospel. We need to help poor people as much as we are able, especially other Christians. We need to be thinking about how to use our wealth to help others.

The rich fool did not think about the fact that he might die at any time. He just thought he would use his riches for pleasure and "relax, eat, drink, be merry." Because he did not put God first, this man was spiritually poor.

Lesson to learn: We must put God and spiritual things first. We have to remember that everything we have comes from God and belongs to Him.

We must always be thankful to God for the things we have.

The Faithful and Wise Servant

Luke 12:35-48

Memory verse: "Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes." Luke 12: 37

Jesus said, "Stay dressed for action and keep your lamps burning, and be like men who are waiting for their master to come home from the wedding feast, so that they may open the door to him at once when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will dress himself for service and have them recline at table, and he will come and serve them. If he comes in the second watch (9 p.m. to 12 a.m.), or in the third (12 a.m. to 3 a.m.), and finds them awake, blessed are those servants!

But know this, that if the master of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have left his house to be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect."

Peter said, "Lord, are you telling this parable for us or for all?"

And the Lord said, "Who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom his master will set over his household, to give them their portion of food at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his master will find so doing when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will set him over all his possessions (things that he owns). But if that servant says to himself, 'My master is delayed in coming,' and begins to beat the male and female servants, and to eat and drink and get drunk, the master of that servant will come on a day when he does not expect him and at an hour he does not know, and will cut him in pieces and put him with the unfaithful. And that servant who knew his master's will but did not get ready or act according to his will, will receive a severe beating.

But the one who did not know, and did what deserved a beating, will receive a light beating. Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more.

Lessons to Learn: We must be ready for Christ to come at any time. Our master, Jesus, will reward us if we have done good deeds and punish us if we have done bad deeds.

The more that God has given us, the more he will expect from us.

Parable of the Sower

Matthew 13: 3-8, 18-23; Mark 4: 3-8, 14-20; Luke 8: 5-8, 11-15

Memory verse: "Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God." Luke 8: 11

And when a great crowd was gathering and people from town after town came to Him, He said in a parable, "A sower (a person planting seeds) went out to sow his seed. And as he sowed, some fell along the path and was trampled underfoot, and the birds of the air devoured it. And some fell on the rock where it did not have much soil, and as it grew up, it withered away, because it had no moisture. And some fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up with it and choked it. And some fell into good soil and grew and yielded a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." As he said these things, he called out, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

And when His disciples asked Him what this parable meant, He said, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God, but for others they are in parables, so that 'seeing they may not see, and hearing they may not understand.'

Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. The ones along the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, so that they may not believe and be saved. And the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy. But these have no root; they believe for a while, and in time of testing (trials, temptations) fall away. And as for what fell among the thorns, they are those who hear; but as they go on their way, they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life; and their fruit does not mature (get ripe). As for that in the good soil, they are those who, hearing the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patience.

We might summarize the parable this way: Some people do not understand or believe the word of God. Then the devil comes and takes away the seed. This is like the seed that fell by the roadside.

Other people hear the word of God, believe it, and start to obey it. But when anything bad happens, they stop obeying God. They are like the plants growing in the rocks. Then there are people who hear and obey the word of God, but let the cares of the world – their job, their play, or taking care of their things – choke out the word. They stop obeying God. They are like the plants killed by the thorns.

But some people are like the good ground. They hear the word of God and understand it. They obey God and they grow. They continue to do more and more good things for God. Some people bear a hundred times the fruit from the seed, some people bear sixty times the fruit, and some thirty times the fruit.

Of course, we want to be like the good ground. If we hear God's word and do it, we will bear good fruit for Him.

Lessons to Learn: When the word of God is preached, many kinds of people hear it.

We want to be the kind of people with the right heart, who hear God's word and obey it all our lives.

It is the responsibility of the one who hears the word to be sure he has the right heart.

Weeds (Tares) Among Wheat

Matthew 13: 24-30, 36-43

Memory verse: "Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father." Matthew 13: 43

Jesus put another parable before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds (tares) among the wheat and went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. And the servants of the master of the house came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then does it have weeds?"

He said to them, "An enemy has done this."

So the servants said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?"

But he said, "No, lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until the harvest, and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, 'Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn."

Then He left the crowds and went into the house. And His disciples came to Him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field."

He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed is the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the world, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the end of the world. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of His kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth (grinding the teeth together). Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

Lessons to Learn: This parable teaches us something about the world.

In the world there are Christians, but there are evil people, too.

Sometimes it is hard to tell which people are evil because some people act

good, but really are not. Or they say that they are teaching God's word, but they are teaching something false.

Christians and evil people will live in the world together until the Judgment Day when the evil people will be burned with fire.

After the Judgment Day, Christians will be in heaven with the Father.

Three Parables About the Kingdom of God

Matthew 13: 31-33; Mark 4: 26-32; Luke 13: 18-21

Memory verse: "The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that a man took and sowed in his field." Matthew 13: 31

The Parable of the Growing Seed

And He (Jesus) said, "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground. He sleeps and rises night and day, and the seed sprouts and grows; he knows not how. The earth produces by itself, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. But when the grain is ripe, at once he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come."

A person who plants the seed of God's kingdom must be patient and wait for the seed to grow. God is the one who makes the seed grow. The seed is the word of God that will grow inside good hearts. People who obey God are the harvest.

The Parable of the Mustard Seed

And He said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable shall we use for it? It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when sown on the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth, yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes larger than all the garden plants and puts out large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables He spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it. He did not speak to them without a parable, but privately to His own disciples he explained everything

-----.

The tiny mustard seed grows into a tree that can be up to twelve feet tall. God's kingdom would start small and spread into the whole world.

The Parable of the Leaven

And again He said, "To what shall I compare the kingdom of God? It is like leaven that a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, until it was all leavened."

Leaven is something that is added to dough to make it rise. Usually it is yeast. Just a little yeast added to dough will make it change.

Lessons to Learn: All these parables show how the Kingdom of God would start small and grow very large.

God's Kingdom would be a big influence in the world.

When the seed is planted, people need to believe it, obey it, and grow as Christians.

Something great was going to come from small beginnings.

The Parable of the Hidden Treasure

"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."

The Parable of the Pearl of Great Value

"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant (seller) in search of fine pearls, who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it."

The Parable of the Net

"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and gathered fish of every kind. When it was full, men drew it ashore and sat down and sorted the good into containers but threw away the bad. So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous (good) and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping (crying) and gnashing (grinding) of teeth."

Preaching the gospel gathers in all kinds of people. Remember the Parable of the Sower and the rocky soil and thorny soil. Some people hear the word, but never really obey and grow as Christians. Some people never really repent of their sins, and other people let the concerns of the world keep them from continuing to obey God.

Lessons to Learn: Two of these parables tell us about how valuable the kingdom of heaven is.

The kingdom of heaven is the church.

Preaching the gospel draws in many people, but not all of them are obedient Christians.

The Good Shepherd

John 10: 1-18, 25-30 Psalm 23

Memory verse: "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want. (need anything)" Psalm 23: 1

"Truly, truly, I say to you, he who does not enter the sheepfold (a pen for sheep) by the door but climbs in by another way, that man is a thief and a robber. But he who enters by the door is the shepherd of the sheep...The sheep hear his voice, and he calls His own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes before them, and the sheep follow him, for they know his voice. A stranger they will not follow, but they will flee (run away) from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers." This figure of speech Jesus used with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. All who came before Me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the door. If anyone enters by Me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly.

I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. He who is a hired hand and not a shepherd, who does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and flees, and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. He flees because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. I am the Good Shepherd. Lessons to Learn: People are like sheep and need someone to lead them.

Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we should follow Him. We should not listen to wicked people who try to lead us another way. Jesus knows His people (sheep) so well that He calls them by name.



10 The Unmerciful Servant

Matthew 18: 21-35

Memory verse: "Our Father in heaven,... forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors." Matthew 6: 9, 12 **(A debt is something owed to another person.)

Then Peter came up and said to Him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?"

Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times.

Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. (He wanted to collect the money that the servants owed him.) When he began to settle, one man was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents (a large amount of money). And since he could not pay, his master ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. So the servant fell on his knees, imploring (begging) him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him, the master of that servant released him and forgave him the debt.

But when that same servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii (a much smaller amount of money), and seizing him, he began to choke him, saying, 'Pay what you owe.' So his fellow servant fell down and pleaded with (begged) him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' He refused and went and put him in prison until he should pay the debt.

When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed (upset), and they went and reported to their master all that had taken place. Then his master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. And should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his master delivered him to the jailers, until he should pay all his debt. So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

Lessons to Learn: Mercy is compassion or forgiveness shown toward someone whom you had the power to punish.

God forgives us a great debt of our sins when we obey Him and repent of our sins.

If we want God to forgive us, we must forgive people who sin against us and repent of their sin.

11 The Good Samaritan

Luke 10: 25- 37

And a lawyer stood up and put Him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

And He said to him, "What is written in the Law? How does it read to you?"

And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself."

And He said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live."

But wishing to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Jesus replied and said, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among robbers, and they stripped him and beat him, and went away leaving him half dead. And by chance a priest was going down on that road, and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. Likewise a Levite also, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, who was on a journey, came upon him; and when he saw him, he felt compassion (care or concern), and came to him and bandaged up his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them; and he put him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn and took care of him. On the next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper and said, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I return I will repay you.'

And he said, "The one who showed mercy toward him." Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do the same."

Lesson to learn: The priest and the Levite did not love the hurt man because they did not help him.

The Samaritan was a good neighbor and helped the hurt man. He treated him like he would want to be treated.

We show love by what we do. Love is always active and doing.

Parable of the Wedding Feast

Luke 14: 7-14

Memory verse: "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." Luke 14: 11

Now He (Jesus) told a parable to those who were invited, when he noticed how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, "When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor (the best place that is for respected people), lest someone more distinguished (more worthy of respect) than you be invited by him, and he who invited you both will come and say to you, 'Give your place to this person,' and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place.

But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. For everyone who exalts himself (tries to raise himself up in importance) will be humbled (lowered in importance), and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Jesus said also to the man who had invited Him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

Lessons to Learn: We should think of ourselves less than we think of others.

We should not be trying to be the most important person around other people.

We should not be doing things with the idea that we will be repaid for them. God will exalt (raise up) people who are humble.

And the master said to the servant, 'Go out to the highways and hedges and compel people to come in, that my house may be filled. For I tell you, none of those men who were invited shall taste my banquet.'"

This parable followed the parable of the wedding feast.

Lessons To Learn: In this parable, the banquet is like the kingdom of God with all of its blessings.

People who refuse God's invitation will not be able to come into His kingdom.

The Jews were God's chosen people who were first invited into God's kingdom. When they disobeyed and rejected Jesus, God invited the Gentiles into His kingdom, too.



Just so, I tell you, there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Lessons to Learn: God/Jesus is like the man who had lost one sheep. The ninety-nine sheep are compared to righteous people who do not need to repent.

The lost sheep and the lost coin are compared to a person who is a sinner. When he repents, there is joy in heaven.

Luke 15:11-32

Memory verse: "This your brother was dead, and is alive; he was lost, and is found." Luke 15: 32

And He (Jesus) said, "There was a man who had two sons. And the younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of property that is coming to me.' And he divided his property between them. Not many days later, the younger son gathered all he had and took a journey into a far country, and there he wasted his property in reckless (careless) living. And when he had spent everything, a severe famine (a lack of food) arose in that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him into his fields to feed pigs. And bring the fattened calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate. For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his older son was in the field, and as he came and drew near to the house, he heard music and dancing. And he called one of the servants and asked what these things meant. And he said to him, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fattened calf, because he has received him back safe and sound.' But he was angry and refused to go in. His father came out and entreated him, but he answered his father, 'Look, these many years I have served you, and I never disobeyed your command, yet you

never gave me a young goat, that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came, who has devoured your property with prostitutes (sinful women), you killed the fattened calf for him!'

And he said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. It was fitting to celebrate and be glad, for this your brother was dead, and is alive; he was lost, and is found."

Lessons to Learn: God is like the father who is watching and waiting to welcome his children back when they repent.

The younger son finally "came to himself"/started thinking correctly and realized how badly he had sinned.

The older son should have been happy that his brother had repented.

Luke 16:19-31

Memory verse: "If your brothers won't listen to Moses and the prophets, they won't listen to someone who comes back from the dead." Luke 16: 31

Now there was a certain rich man, and he was clothed in purple and fine linen, faring sumptuously (living richly) every day; and a certain beggar named Lazarus was laid at his gate, full of sores, and desiring (wanting) to be fed with the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table; yea, even the dogs come and licked his sores.

And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and that he was carried away by the angels into Abraham's bosom (Paradise): and the rich man also died, and was buried. And in Hades he lifted up his eyes, being in torments (suffering), and saw Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom (chest). And he cried and said, "Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am in anguish in this flame."

But Abraham said, "Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things: but now here he is comforted and you are in anguish (great suffering). And besides all this, between us and you there is a great gulf (a deep pit, hole) fixed, that they that would pass from here to you may not be able, and that none may cross over from there to us."

And he said, "I pray you therefore, father, that thou would send him to my father's house; for I have five brethren; that he may testify (give evidence) to them, lest they also come into this place of torment."

But Abraham said, "They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them."

And he said, "No, father Abraham: but if one go to them from the dead, they will repent."

And he said unto him, "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded (caused to believe), if one rise from the dead."

Lessons to Learn: The rich man had plenty of things on earth, but he was poor because he did not have God.

Lazarus had almost nothing on earth, but he really was rich because he was faithful to God.

God has given men free will to choose to be good or evil.

God has given us everything we need to obey Him in the Bible.



17 Workers in the Vineyard

Matthew 20: 1-16

Memory verse: "The gift of God eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Romans 6: 23

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a master of a house who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour (9 a.m.) he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' So they went. Going out again about the sixth hour (12 noon) and the ninth hour (3 p.m.), he did the same. And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing. And he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' (The eleventh hour was the last hour of the day.)

They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.'

He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' And when evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius. Now when those hired first came, they thought they would receive more, but each of them also received a denarius.

And on receiving it they grumbled at the master of the house, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.'

But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong. Did you not agree with me for a denarius? Take what belongs to you and go. I choose to give to this last worker as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge (resent), my generosity (kindness)?' So the last will be first, and the first last."

Lessons to Learn: The reward for people who obey God is a home in heaven.

Whether a person learns about God and obeys Him when he is young or whether a person learns about God and obeys Him when he is old, he will be able to go to heaven.

We must start right now to obey God. Remember that a denarius was money equaling a day's pay.

The Parable of the Persistent Widow

Luke 18: 1-8: 11:

Memory verse: "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you." Luke 11: 9

And He (Jesus) told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart (become discouraged). He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected man. And there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, 'Give me justice against my adversary (enemy).' For a while he refused, but afterward he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God nor respect man, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will give her justice, so that she will not beat me down by her continual coming.""

And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge says. And will not God give justice to his elect (chosen people), who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will give justice to them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

In Luke 11, Jesus also said, "And I tell you, ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. What father among you, if his son asks for a fish, will instead of a fish give him a serpent; or if he asks for an egg, will give him a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

Lessons to Learn: This parable was to teach people to keep praying and not grow tired or weary.

God will hear the prayers of people who obey Him.

God will give us what we need, if we ask according to His will.

This widow is called "persistent" because she kept going to the judge for what she wanted. She was determined and did not stop asking.

 The judge helped the woman because it was the right thing to do. The judge giving the woman the justice that she asked for is like God who gives His people justice. God's elect are Christians.

The Pharisee and the Tax Collector

Luke 18:9-14

The Parable of the Two Sons

Matthew 21: 28-32

Memory verse: "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." Luke 18: 14

He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and treated others with contempt (scorn, disdain, disrespect): "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners (persons who get money from other people by threatening them or taking the money by force), unjust (not right or fair), adulterers (people who cheat on their husband or wife), or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I get.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his house justified (righteous before God), rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

The Parable of the Two Sons

"What do you think? A man had two sons. And he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' And he answered, 'I will not,' but afterward he changed his mind and went.

And he went to the other son and said the same. And he answered, 'I go, sir,' but did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?"

They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes go into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him. And even when you saw it, you did not afterward change your minds and believe him."

- **Lessons to Learn:** We should always be humble before God, which means that we realize that we are sinners, we ask God to forgive us, and we are willing to listen to His word.
- We do not judge how good we are by what other people do. We measure ourselves by the Bible.
- Children should always obey their parents. We obey God when we obey our parents.
- If we disobey, we can make ourselves right by being sorry and starting to do the right thing. (repenting)

Wicked Tenants of the Vineyard

Matthew 21:33-44; Mark 12:1-12; Luke 20:9-19

Memory verse: "The kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people producing its fruits." Matthew 21:43

(Jesus said to the chief priests and elders,) Hear another parable. There was a master of a house who planted a vineyard and put a fence around it and dug a winepress in it and built a tower and leased it to tenants (renters), and went into another country. When the season for fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to get his fruit. And the tenants took his servants and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other servants, more than the first. And they did the same to them. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son."

But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and have his inheritance." And they took him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. When therefore the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?

They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death and let out the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the fruits in their seasons."

Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes? Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people producing its fruits. And the one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and when it falls on anyone, it will crush him."

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they perceived (understood) that he was speaking about them. And although they were seeking to arrest him, they feared the crowds, because they held him to be a prophet.

Lessons to Learn: Jesus was the cornerstone that the Jews rejected or refused to hear. He was telling the Jews that they would be destroyed because they fell over Him or stumbled because of their disbelief.

In this parable the master is God, the vineyard is Israel, and the renters are the Jewish leaders who refused to hear God's prophets and His Son. The new tenants who would bear fruit are Gentiles who would believe and enter the kingdom.

21 Wedding Feast

Matthew 22:1-14

Memory verse: "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven." Matthew 7: 21

And again Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son, and sent his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding feast, but they would not come. Again he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those who are invited, "See, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready. Come to the wedding feast."

But they paid no attention and went off, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his servants, treated them shamefully, and killed them. The king was angry, and he sent his troops and destroyed those murderers and burned their city. Then he said to his servants, 'The wedding feast is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore to the main roads and invite to the wedding feast as many as you find.' And those servants went out into the roads and gathered all whom they found, both bad and good. So the wedding hall was filled with guests.

But when the king came in to look at the guests, he saw there a man who had no wedding garment. And he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding garment?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind (tie) him hand and foot and cast him into the outer darkness. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

Matthew 7: 21tells us, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

Lessons to Learn: In this parable, the king is like God who calls or invites men to the kingdom. The son is Jesus.

Some people who were invited to the feast just did not come. Other people killed the king's servants. This shows that people react in different ways when they hear God's invitation.


The Jews had been the first people who God called. When they refused to obey God, God called other people (Gentiles).

(Jesus said,) "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. For when the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps.

As the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a cry, 'Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those virgins rose and trimmed their lamps. And the foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.'

The Vine and the Branches

John 15: 1-11

Memory verse: "By this My Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be My disciples." John 15: 8

"I am the true vine, and My Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in Me that does not bear fruit He takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit He prunes (cuts), that it may bear more fruit. Already you are clean because of the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in Me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit. for apart from Me you can do nothing. If anyone does not abide in Me, he is thrown away like a branch and withers; and the branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. By this my Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be My disciples. As the Father has loved Me, so have I loved you. Abide in My love. If you keep My commandments, you will abide in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love. These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full."

Jesus compares Christians to branches. God is the vinedresser who wants His people to bear much fruit, so He prunes branches to make them stronger and more fruitful. Branches (Christians) have to abide in (stay in) Christ to bear fruit.

Lessons to Learn: A branch is useless if it does not bear fruit.

A branch cannot bear fruit by itself. The branch must be connected to the vine.

Branches that do not bear fruit are cut off and burned. We abide in Christ's love IF we keep His commandments.

Parables about the Second Coming of Christ

Mark 13:32-37; Luke 12: 35-40

Memory verse: "Be on guard, keep awake. For you do not know when the time will come." Mark 13: 33

Waiting for the Master of the House to Return

(Jesus said)"But concerning that day or that hour, no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Be on guard, keep awake. For you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his servants in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to stay awake. Therefore stay awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or when the rooster crows, or in the morning—lest he come suddenly and find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake."

Coming Like a Thief in the Night

"Stay dressed for action and keep your lamps burning, and be like men who are waiting for their master to come home from the wedding feast, so that they may open the door to him at once when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will dress himself for service and have them recline at table, and he will come and serve them. If he comes in the second watch (10 p.m. to 2 a.m.), or in the third (2a.m. to sunrise), and finds them awake, blessed are those servants! But know this, that if the master of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have left his house to be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man (Christ) is coming at an hour you do not expect."

Lessons to Learn: We always need to be ready for Christ to come again. No one knows when Christ will come again except God. We have to be busy doing God's will, so we can be ready for Christ to come.

Matthew 25: 1, 14-30

Memory verse: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much."

Matthew 25:23

(A talent was a Greek coin worth 6,000 days of pay.)

For it,(the kingdom of heaven), will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted to them his property. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away.

He who had received the five talents went at once and traded with them, and he made five talents more. So also he who had the two talents made two talents more. But he who had received the one talent went and dug in the ground and hid his master's money.

Now after a long time the master of those servants came and settled accounts with them. And he who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five talents more, saying, "Master, you delivered to me five talents; here I have made five talents more."

His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master."

And he also who had the two talents came forward, saying, "Master, you delivered to me two talents; here I have made two talents more."

His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master."

He also who had received the one talent came forward, saying, "Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you scattered no seed, so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours."

But his master answered him, "You wicked and slothful (lazy) servant! You knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I scattered no seed? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and at my coming I should have received what was my own with

interest. So take the talent from him and give it to him who has the ten talents. For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And cast the worthless servant into the outer darkness. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Lessons to Learn: When God gives us the ability to do things for Him, we must be sure to do what we can to obey Him.

It doesn't matter if we are able to do a little or a lot, as long as we do what we are able to do.

We will be rewarded or punished for what we choose to do.

The Sheep and the Goats

Matthew 25:31-46

Memory verse: "Come, you who are blessed by My Father, inherit the kingdom." Matthew 25: 34

When the Son of Man comes in His glory, and all the angels with Him, then He will sit on His glorious throne. Before Him will be gathered all the nations, and He will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. And He will place the sheep on His right, but the goats on the left. Then the King will say to those on His right, "Come, you who are blessed by My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave Me food, I was thirsty and you gave Me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed Me, I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and you visited Me, I was in prison and you came to Me."

Then the righteous will answer him, saying, "Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink? And when did we see You a stranger and welcome You, or naked and clothe You? And when did we see You sick or in prison and visit You?"

And the King will answer them, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these My brothers, you did it to Me."

Then He will say to those on His left, "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave Me no food, I was thirsty and you gave Me no drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome Me, naked and you did not clothe Me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me."

Then they also will answer, saying, "Lord, when did we see You hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to You?"

Then He will answer them, saying, "Truly, I say to you, as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to Me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.

Lessons to Learn: Jesus compared righteous people to sheep, and unrighteous people to goats.

Each person will be judged according to what he has done.

When we are servants and do good deeds for others, we are doing the deeds for Christ.
